A 2015 Summer Session Field School sponsored by the Department of Anthropology at the University of Washington and The Confederated Tribes of Grande Ronde Tribal Historic Preservation Office

The University of Washington and the federally recognized Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde Community of Oregon are working together to document and preserve tribal cultural resources on the tribe's reservation in Grand Ronde, OR. This summer students in ARCHY 270 will work with and alongside the Grand Ronde Tribal Historic Preservation Office and tribal students to study the history and development of the 19th century reservation landscape. Together, we will examine two historic period sites on the reservation: the mid-19th century Indian agency camp and the Grand Ronde tribal school, which was founded in 1855. Students will accomplish this work while living on the Grand Ronde reservation for the duration of the project.
