Kulick (1995, Routledge: London); and *The Ethnographic Film Catalogue, Vol. II* (1990, Royal Anthropological Institute: London). She has published numerous articles and book chapters and recently returned from Iceland on a Snorri Sturlusson Icelandic Fellowship (2019) where she was conducting research for her current book on an historical Icelandic female sea captain who was a solitary #MeToo movement 200 years ahead of her time.
